

### Still working for too little in Cleveland

All working people — no matter their race, gender, or the kind of job they do — should be paid enough to live a good life and provide for their families. Labor market pressures forced many employers to increase pay during the pandemic. Federal stimulus stabilized people's incomes. But in 2021, four of the Cleveland area's 10 most common occupations paid so little that a worker with a family of three would need food aid to get by. These four occupations alone employed 80,180 people.

**Wages up, but not enough:** From 2019 to 2021, median pay rose in six of the 10 most common jobs in the Cleveland area. Changes ranged from general and operations managers being paid \$4.21-per-hour (-8.1%) less, to registered nurses being paid \$1.91-per-hour (+5.3%) more. Considering nearly two decades of wage suppression that predated COVID, average annual change in pay ranged from losses of 11 cents per hour for general managers to gains of 13 cents for registered nurses over the whole span from 2000 to 2021.

## COVID disproportionately destroyed low-paying jobs

COVID-19 disproportionately destroyed the jobs of low-paid Ohioans: people in economic precarity even before the pandemic. Statewide, these jobs are typically more likely held by Black and brown Ohioans, and women.

Eight of greater Cleveland's 10 most common pre-COVID occupations lost jobs from 2019 to 2021. As people scaled back dining out, employers laid off 8,810 fast food workers and 4,020 waiters and waitresses. Movement to online shopping meant fewer retail salespeople and cashiers. Health care needs led to hiring of 2,910 new registered nurses, but Greater Cleveland lost 1,350 home health aides.
