

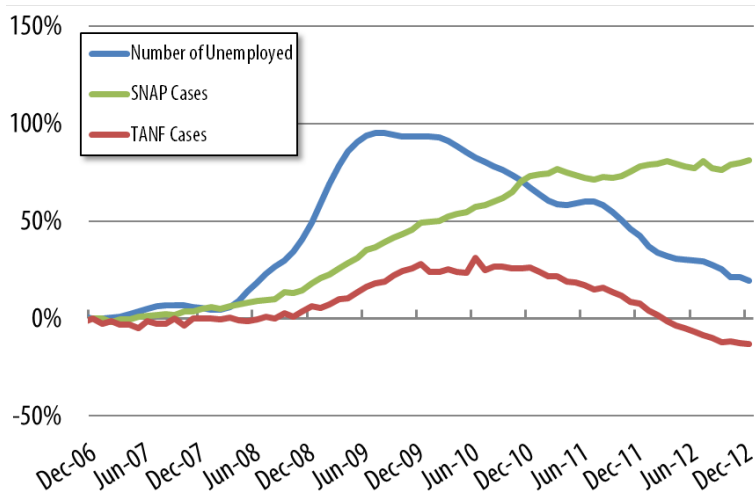

TANF, SNAP and Unemployment Trends

■ National caseloads were declining before the recession. After a modest increase in response to the economic downturn, by the end of 2012, national TANF caseloads had returned to where they were in December, 2006.

Changes in TANF Cases, SNAP Cases and the Number of Unemployed Persons



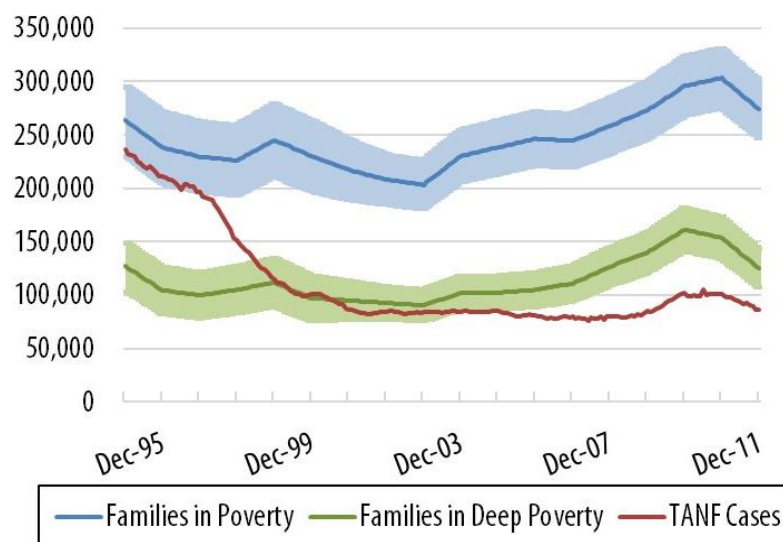
Since welfare reform, TANF has weakened as a safety net.

Beginning in 2006, this analysis uses TANF caseload data collected directly from state agencies rather than the official data reported by HHS in order to more consistently reflect the number of families receiving cash welfare in each state over time. Unlike the HHS data, these data include solely state-funded programs, and exclude worker supplement programs.

Deep Poverty refers to families below half the poverty line. Shading in graph shows the 90% confidence interval (lower and upper bound) of poverty estimates. Two years of Current Population Survey (CPS) data were merged to improve reliability. For example, Dec-10 represents merged CPS poverty data for calendar years 2010 and 2011.
